

I had to start quickly to catch the Niagara-on-the-Lake Santa Claus parade December 10, 2011 preparations. Joint Active Membership

Joint Active Membership for skipper and spouse now available

Joint Active Membership allows skipper and spouse to be joint members of the Niagara-on-the-Lake Sailing Club. Each Joint Active Membership only allows for one vote, however the change in the club bylaws allows for the spouse in this joint membership to vote and also makes them eligible to serve on the board. (Only one vote may be cast by the joint members and only one can serve on the board at any given time.)

Prospective members applying to be an associate member will be given an individual membership application.

Associate members applying to become active members will be given the choice of an individual application or a Joint Active Membership application.

Existing active members wishing to switch to a Joint Active Membership in order to include their spouse will complete a Joint Active Membership application form as a formality and for office records.

Here's how it works:

The applicants simply decide whether they want an individual membership or a joint one and they are given the appropriate membership application. For example:

If someone wishes to join the Niagara-on-the-Lake Sailing Club or if an associate member wishes to become an active member he or she can fill out the traditional individual membership application.

Or if an associate member (applying for active membership) and his or her spouse wish to become Joint Active Members they will be given a Joint Membership application.

Existing active members who wish to switch to a Joint Active Membership would complete the application form.

This expresses their desire for both be included on the membership and will state which of the two will remain the active member if their joint membership dissolves.

The Navy Of 1812: Sailors On The Lakes July 13-15, 2012

Let the battle begin

Re-enactors celebrate 200th anniversary of War of 1812



There will be four brigantines and two schooners tied up along the Niagara-on-the-Lake Sailing Club dock and long boats in our launch ramp as some 200 re-enactors and 300 sailors get ready for a land and naval "sham" battle to mark the 200th anniversary of the War of 1812.

The re-enactment takes place July 13 to 15 and is one of the special events planned in Niagara-on-the-Lake.

Some longboats will arrive by water from Hamilton on Thursday, July 12, others will be launched from NOLSC on Friday. They will be docked at Navy Hall. Saturday morning there will be a processional row as they move to the operational area and landing zone off Queens Royal Park and rehearse defensive dispositions and an assault landing.

Between noon and 1 p.m. the Tall Ship 1812 Squadron (four brigantines and two schooners) arrives and anchors off Queens Royal Park. The longboats then join the tall ships.

At 2 p.m. (or 1400 hours) the Assault Landing begins. This hour-long "sham" battle will be narrated and broadcast to the audience. The Naval Gun Battery and ship's guns take part. After landing troops, longboats continue to operate in the landing zone as backdrop to the battle scenario unfolding on shore.

At 3 p.m. the tall ships raise anchors and move to the NOLSC dock.

The event is organized by Parks Canada and the Navy's Directorate of Naval History and Heritage. All participants are civilian re-enactors or sail trainees. Both the Landing Force and the Defence Ford who will 'oppose' them will be British and no pretend casualties will be falling over.

"The Sailor's World in 1812" program with period music opens in encampment at 7.30 p.m. There will be lanterns hung before all tents and role-playing re-enactors join navel and marine personnel in animating the camp. There will also be an evening tactical inside Fort George.

On Sunday after a wreath laying ceremony at the Clock Towner/Cenotaph, the Tall Ship Squadron departs mouth of Niagara between 11 and 11.30 a.m. cheered on by longboat crews, sailors and marines as it passes by the Longboat Flotilla.

The longboats return to NOLSC for haul out around 4 p.m.
