

### What We Still Need Help With








## **Long Range Planning**

# Junior Sailing News

Preparations are underway for another season. Mark Schantz is returning. He and Lauren McCullough will head up our team of instructors. We'll be holding interviews in March to insure all our positions are filled.

Barb Wells has come up with a plan to hold registrations at the club. There will be three sessions, race team, White Sail II through Bronze V and new students. This will allow us to know exactly how many students we will have in each level. We'll be able to plan our needs for instructors and boats and determine how many new students we can accept. Barb and I will be available for each of the sessions. We'll be announcing the dates soon.

Erin Sauder has designed the T shirts. We have learned to get as much of the preparation out of the way before the staff gets involved with launching.

The policies I spoke of last fall are before the Board for their approval at the March meeting.

Last year we purchased an RS Feva for evaluation as a white sail boat. The instructors graded the Feva based on several categories. The Pros;

The indestructible plastic hull. It really is. I invite you to examine the gunnel portside at the chain plate. The scuff mark is the result of a T bone hit from a 420 in a race. I would have expected hundreds of dollars in repair had it been a fiberglass boat.

The boat is lightweight and rigs easily. Our young students have an easy time launching and retrieving it.

It is fun to sail. Our students vied to be assigned to the Feva.

The boat sails strong enough for the current we operate in.

Cons:

The boat is tender but the open stern makes it self bailing and not the ten minute process as in a Nutshell. Also, the light weight makes it easily righted.


The boat is small. However, our white sail students are also small. Eventually, we should have only two students in our white sail boats. We lose students because they get bored with nothing to do as the third person in a dinghy.

The RS Feva grades out well for our program. The Feva fulfills two important requirements. First, it is inexpensive to purchase, fleet price is about \$5000.00. second the hull really is indestructible and will save us hundreds of dollars in fiberglass repair yearly.

I recommend we begin replacing our white sail fleet with the RS Feva.




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



# NOLSC: OUR FIRST DECADE (1979 - 1988)

As promised in the Fall issue of the Mainsheet, this article summarizes the first 10 years of Club ownership. The source of information is the Mainsheets from this period. Any obvious omission is probably the result of missing Mainsheets as is the case for 1985 where there are only two Mainsheets available - if you have copies of the Mainsheet from the early days, the Club would appreciate having them as they are our primary historical record!

To organize such a summary is a challenge. Generally speaking, the format chosen was to organize by topic rather than present the information chronologically. At the least, this will let you select to read what you are particularly interested in if not the whole article. Hopefully you will enjoy learning about this period of our history.

The signing of the Ownership papers on December 29<sup>th</sup>, 1978 brought about much change. While the Gillinghams became our tenants, they agreed to launch boats that spring and to put in the docks: thereafter it was the Club's responsibility. The store, mechanic's service and new boat sales for Hinterhoeller and C&C were also to be maintained by Gillinghams - by 1984 they were gone. *Murray's Boat Repairs* was retained. All other aspects of the marina such as gas and ice sales, garbage and washroom responsibilities, new boats and membership decisions were the Club's. Prophetically, the January, 1979 Mainsheet states, "In case there's doubt in anyone's mind, if we had not proceeded with this venture, in a year or so we would all be moved elsewhere and the marina gone forever." Within a year, Sheppard's Boat Works on the property next door was purchased by a Toronto Development Company the end result of which we see today.

Our new ownership began with a social event which has become a mainstay, the first Club Cruise which was to RCYC. Also, that summer a "raft up" of 25 boats drifted down the river from Queenston. This was to become an annual event until officialdom decreed that it was illegal for skippers or crew to drink while sailing, *unless aground*. In 1981 the first Sail Past occurred, preceded by a Junior Sailing Regatta in the morning. As the sail past coincided with the Town of Niagara's Bicentennial, the salute was taken from Queen's Park, in the pouring rain, by Commodore Richard Kelly, in the company of the Lord Mayor. To much amusement, several boats found the bottom to be too close to the top. More auspiciously, Elmer Doyle flew trophy flags dating back 50 years. A few years later, the Commodore's Ball became one of the Club's signature events when it was separated from the Awards Ceremony and held at the Victoria Park Restaurant. The terrific social events of today got a good grounding during these early years.

No doubt as a result of hearing about our social calendar, there was a great influx of new members during this period. In May of 1979 the Board decided to accept 25 new members over the next few months so that out of a possible 178 slips available at the time, 153 were held by member, slip priority holders. Six more members were accepted the following year. This influx was accompanied by a need for reconfiguration of the docks and a total realignment of the slips (see the Fall Mainsheet) for 20 of the 31 new boats were over 30 feet. Concurrently, much thought went into redefining the Membership categories during this time an offshoot of which was the "Dry Sailor". George Hinterhoeller, George Greenberger and Eric Rogers, in recognition for their contribution to the Club were each made a Life Member during this time.

Formed to promote sailing and, in particular racing, the Club has never wavered from that objective. In 1982, 107 boats from YYC and NOLSC were registered to race that season, 68 in the Wednesday series. After much lobbying by the International Shark Class Association, the Shark class was recognized by the International Yacht Racing Union, an achievement of great significance to this, the "home of the Shark". Our "home" club hosted the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Shark in 1984 (see accompanying photo; page 2) and in 1987 the Shark Worlds; when 60 Sharks competed. In addition, the Provincial Fireball Association Regatta was held at NOLSC during this time.

On an individual level, Norm Manson's *Spirit* placed second in the Freeman Cup and won the I.O.R. division twice. Not to be outdone, "Skip" Doyle twice won the Stolze Cup, emblematic of match racing supremacy on Lake Ontario. From there he competed at Detroit and at Chicago where he was Great Lakes Champion, winning the Richardson Cup. Adding to the lore of Niagara racing was Geoff Kendrick who competed in the Newport to Bermuda race. Against 126 entries, *Freight Train* claimed 5<sup>th</sup> place in their IOR division. She claimed trophies for "first foreign boat to finish" and "first boat under 49 feet to finish". Many other members, too numerous to name, have won against the best on the Lake.

As the Club developed over these years, security became an issue. Now a private club, there was a need to control and protect Club property and that of the members. For the first time, a gate and lock were placed on the launch ramp, the result of, "...rowdyism and drunkenness in the area as well as use and abuse by not members." As well, the new launch well built at this time required more control as public use interfered with the use of the travel lift. Eventually the launch ramp was restricted to members only. In 1980-81 there was a rash of burglaries and vandalism on the waterfront. St. Catharines Boat Club's docks and clubhouse were vandalized and boats cut adrift. In the basin, six motors were stolen from boats on Shark Alley and when these were replaced the vandals came back and stole the six new, replacement motors. New poles and lights were subsequently installed by the river docks and along Nelson Street as well as a security fence. Excessive public use required gate security measures be instituted. Meanwhile, the Town had other ideas about our property. There was a move by the Town to have a bus parking lot created along Nelson Street which the Club contested and in the "Dock Area Plan", approved in principle by Town Council, there was a call, "...for public access to the river through the marina." With the issue of a new "Dock Area Plan" looming, there is a need to be ever vigilant.

Physical improvements to the property and acquisitions are so numerous that they can only be listed: the original Cayuga dock was removed and ten new slips introduced; the steel wall along the river was installed; the north-west area of the yard was levelled and stoned; extensive electrical upgrades were completed; the tarp building that sat in the dry-sail area was torn down; the travel lift was purchased allowing for boats to be hauled with their masts up and at the same time extensive improvements on the travel well were completed; a pickup truck, Boston Whaler and The Empress were purchased; the pump-out, Club sign, the ramp and docks in the Jr. Sailing area and docks for Shark Alley and along Nelson Street were replaced; most significant to our social activities, the White Building renovations were completed.

What lead to the initial success of NOLSC which lead to the enviable position we hold today? We owe everything to those who had the far-reaching vision that enabled the purchase of the basin and to the members who had faith in them. As our history attests, there was a lot to be done which was achieved by an untold number of hours dedicated to the Club by a great number of people who served on committees and the Board, and to volunteers who helped the Club to achieve so much.

The one constant throughout this period, through the ownership by Gillinghams to today, from 1973 to 2009, is Greig Hunter! Ed McIlroy has been with us since 1982, an important "latecomer" himself.


### 1985 ICE JAM

In 1985 there was an ice jam which extended from the mouth of the river to Queenston. For over a week, an ice breaker barged its way up the river trying to free things up. Although the ice rose to the top of the dock area, it never went over the dock. It did tear out one of the newly installed finger docks on the river. A crane was brought in to raise the other 9 docks above the ice.
